*and anger, and clamour, and evil speaking, be put away from you, with all malice: And be ye kind one to another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake hath forgiven you."*

How often do married couples have a heated argument for any little thing? Quite too often unfortunately. But whenever there is an argument within the marriage, instead of going to sleep angry at each other, it will be very healthy for the marriage if both parties forget about the argument and forgive each other. That is why Paul said to not let the sun go down upon your wrath. Paul also said to not give place to the devil. That is, whenever there is something wrong, close the gap. Don't let the devil make the gap wider because destruction will loom over the horizon.

Forgiveness is one of the most important rules of the game. None of us are perfect, and so therefore each one of us will need to be forgiven at one time or another. But forgiveness within a marriage is essential. Another rule is to never bring up the past.
